

## Thus saith the Lord...

## And when the king came in to see the guests, he saw there a man which had not on a wedding garment:

- 22:12 And he saith unto him, Friend, how camest thou in hither not having a wedding garment?
  - > And he was speechless.

- This is a parable within a parable.
- And it is also a very close continuation and amplification of the previous one.
  - It is the story of a guest who appeared at a royal wedding feast without a proper wedding garment.

- Among the ancients,
   long white robes were often
   worn at public festivals;
  - And those who appeared on such occasions with any other garments were esteemed, worthy of punishment.

- The person who invited the guests
   provided such

   a garment for each,
- It was this which made the conduct of the guest mentioned in the text inexcusable.

## •God is constantly warning the reprobate of their impending fate,

•And pleading with them to turn away from sin.

 Nothing demonstrates God's love more than the various warnings throughout the pages of Scripture, urging sinners

to flee from the wrath to come.
(1 Thessalonians 1:10)

- Anyone who knows anything about Scripture knows it is filled with warnings about the judgment to come,
  - Warnings about hell,
  - Warnings about
     the severity
     of divine punishment.

- It is true that the door is open to all,
- But when they come they must bring new life which seeks to fit the love which has been given to them.

- Grace is not only a gift;
  It is a grave responsibility.
  - A man/woman

    cannot go on

    living the life
    he/she lived before
    he/she met Jesus Christ.

- Christians must be clothed:
  - In a new <u>purity</u>
  - A new holiness
  - A new goodness.
  - The old must be put away.
    - As Christ provides

       new garments
       of Righteousness

- The door is open, but it is not open for the sinner to come and remain a sinner,
  - But for the sinner to come and become a saint.

The way in which one comes anything demonstrates the spirit in which he/she comes.

- This parable

  has nothing to do
  with the clothes
  in which we go to church;
  - It has everything to do with the attitude in which we go to God's house.

- There are garments:
  - of the mind
  - of the <u>heart</u>
    - of the soul
- And these are
   the garments

   without which we
   ought not to approach God.

- •Sometimes the warnings of Scripture bear the marks of divine wrath.
- They sound <u>severe</u>.
  - •They reflect God's hatred of sin.

- •They warn of the irreversible condemnation that will befall sinners.
- They are unsettling, unpleasant, even terrifying.

But they are admonitions from a loving God who weeps over the destruction of the wicked. (Matthew 23:37)

 They are necessary expressions from the heart of a compassionate Creator who takes no pleasure in the death of the wicked. (Ezekiel 33:11)

• Ezekiel 33:11 As I live, saith the Lord GOD, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked; that the wicked turn from his way and live: turn ye, turn ye from your evil ways; for why will ye die, O house of Israel?

- Jesus told this parable in <u>Matthew 22:2–14</u>
   <u>to warn of indifference.</u>
  - He sent his servants
     <u>to invite the</u>
     <u>wedding quests.</u>
- Scripture says simply,
   "they were unwilling to come"
   (v. 3).

 The king sends his servants again, saying, "Behold, I have prepared my dinner; my oxen and my fattened livestock are all butchered and everything is ready; come to the wedding feast" (v. 4).

- But the invited guests remained unwilling to come.
  - "They paid no attention and went their way, one to his own farm, another to his business" (vv. 5–6).
    - This was outrageous, inexcusable behavior!
  - And the king judged them <u>severely for it</u>.

The king then said:
 "The wedding is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy.
 Go therefore to the main highways, and as many as you find there, invite to the wedding feast" (v. 9).

- He opened the invitation to all comers.
  - Jesus closes with this:
     "Many are called,
     but few are chosen"
     (v. 14).

- The parable represents God's dealing with the nation of Israel.
  - They were the invited guests.
  - But they
     rejected the Messiah.
  - They wouldn't come
     so Jesus said to them:

- You search the Scriptures, <u>because you think</u>
   that in them
   you have eternal life;
  - and it is these that bear witness of Me;
- and you are unwilling to come to Me, that you may have life. (John 5:39–40)

- God's love for mankind does not stop with a warning of the judgment to come.
- It also invites sinners to partake of divine mercy.
  - It offers forgiveness and mercy.

 Jesus said, "Come to Me, all who are weary and heavyladen, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you, and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart; and you shall find rest for your souls" (Matthew 11:28-29).

- In "The Wedding Feast", the Lord is revealing Himself and the nature of Israel's rejection more clearly than He did in the parable of the vineyard...
- There He was indeed the <u>son</u>; but here He is a <u>royal son</u>.

 In this parable, we also see an expansion of the element of Divine Judgment.

- This parable, also describes judgment upon those who have accepted the King's invitation,
  - Yet <u>not</u> in the way it was intended to be received!

- Jesus said, the <u>kingdom of heaven</u> is likened to a wedding feast (Matthew 22:1-2)
  - Isaiah had used the figure of a feast to prophecy of the Messianic age. (Isaiah 25:6)
  - Book of Revelation describes a future marriage of the Lamb and His Bride (Rev 19:7)

## • Matthew 22:4 "All things are ready"

- The table is spread.
  - •The garments are waiting.

- And yet the invitation is rejected.
  - By those <u>indifferent</u>.
     (Matthew 22:3-5)
  - By those <u>rebellious</u>.
     (Matthew 22:6)
- The King's reaction is furious
   (Matthew 22:7)

- And a guest has arrived <u>improperly attired.</u>
   (Matthew 22:11-14)
- To not wear the provided garment <u>showed a lack of</u> <u>respect and appreciation</u>
  - No real excuse could be offered for not wearing one
    - "He was speechless"
       (Matthew 22:12)

- The <u>seriousness of the insult</u> is seen in the reaction of the king.
  - Matthew 22:13
     Then the king said to the servants,
  - Bind him hand and foot,
    - and <u>cast him out</u> into the outer darkness;
  - there shall be the <u>weeping</u> and the <u>gnashing</u> of teeth.

- Jesus' conclusion in

  <u>Matthew 22:14</u>

  <u>summarizes the main point</u>

  of the entire parable.
  - The <u>invitation</u> of God is extended to all,
  - But few receive it in such a way to be among the "chosen"

- This invitation to "The Wedding Feast" is still being offered today.
  - With that in mind, let us consider
     a few more thoughts

- The King's invitation can be rejected through indifference.
- Many people do not know God because of a lack of interest.
  - For this reason alone they will be <u>condemned</u>.

## • 2 Thessalonians 1:7 The Lord Jesus shall be revealed from heaven with his mighty angels,

- 1:8 In flaming fire taking vengeance on them that know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ:
  - 1:9 Who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of his power;

- There are many who know full well the Father's invitation.
- But for whatever reason they <u>rebel</u> against it
- In so doing, they store up for themselves God's righteous indignation (Romans 2:4-11)

- Many seek to attend the "wedding" in apparel of their own choosing.
- Choosing their own goodness rather than the "Righteousness" of God. (Romans 10:1-3)

- People do this today, when they expect salvation on terms different than those taught in the gospel.
- Trying to obtain salvation <u>based upon their</u> <u>own good works.</u>

- Expecting salvation based on "faith alone".
- When the Bible plainly says,
   "NOT by faith alone. (James 2:24)

- One must be willing to put on the "apparel" that God gives us:
  - We must"put on"Jesus Christ!
- Which is done through
   "Baptism"

## • Galatians 3:27 For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have <u>put on</u> Christ.

•There is your "wedding garment"!

- We must "put on" the new man!
- Ephesians 4:24 You must put on the new self, which is created in God's likeness and reveals itself in the true life that is upright and holy.


 Do not be found at wedding feast wearing the apparel of the
