

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Thus saith the Lord...

- The world's deadliest snake is the black mamba.
 - It is found throughout many parts of the <u>African continent.</u>
- They are highly aggressive, and strike with deadly precision.
 - They are also the
 <u>fastest land snake in the world</u>,
 capable of reaching speeds of <u>up to 12 mph.</u>

- These fearsome snakes can strike up to 12 times in a row.
- The venom is a fast acting neurotoxin.
 - Resulting in death as fast as
 15 minutes.

- Because they are so small people do not expect to die from their bites.
- How can something so small be so deadly?
 - In our passage today,
 <u>we are warned</u>
 about something very small
 that can be very deadly:
 our own desires.

•James 1:13

Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am tempted by God," for God cannot be tempted by evil, and he himself tempts no one.

- Our desires are the source of our temptations,
- And if nothing is done about them, there are
 deadly consequences.

•James 1:13 Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am tempted by God," for God cannot be tempted by evil, and he himself tempts no one.

The idea here is that
 God cannot be responsible
 for our temptations
 because
 He is a good God.

 James writes first <u>a word of warning</u> and then a word <u>of comfort</u>.

- God cannot
 entice you to sin
 because He Himself
 cannot be tempted with evil.
 - He doesn't face temptations.
 - He doesn't have the desire to sin.
 - He's perfect and completely holy.

- When Satan calls we must be careful lest we be pulled in by the hook and caught by Satan.
 - •Remember, there are no free lunches.

 What we need to see is that temptation and sin has a domino effect that is difficult to stop.

•Each stage leads to the next stage.

- Our desires
 give Satan the advantage
 with which to entice us.
- We cave into the temptation.
 - If we keep biting the hook, we become separated from God and eventually spiritual death.

- God does not make bad things happen to you.
 - Too often God is treated like he is the "Karma God."
- We get a flat tire and wonder what we did wrong to make God mad.
 - We think that we need
 to do good things
 so that good things
 will happen to us.

- But God is not karma.
- God tempts no one.
 - Don't blame God.
 - So where are all these temptations coming from?

- Not once have your temptations ever come from God.
- All that comes from God is good, because He is good.

James writes:

"Do not be deceived, my beloved brothers. Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (James 1:16-17).

- •James calls God "<u>the Father of lights</u>."
- The earth turns, the sun gives light, but there are shadows that are to due the nature of the creation.

- But God
 does not shift.
 - •God does not change.
- As light illuminates.
- •So the Father of lights gives the light of reason.

- God is a holy God.
- The Scriptures testify:

"For I am the Lord who brought you up out of the land of Egypt to be your God.

• You shall therefore be holy, for I am holy"
(Leviticus 11:45)

• "Exalt the Lord our God. and worship at his holy mountain; for the Lord our God is holy!" (Psalm 99:9)

• "And the four living creatures never cease to say, "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty, who was and is and is to come!" (Revelation 4:8)

 Why would James feel like it's necessary to tell us that God is good?

 Why does James feel the need to remind us that we can't blame God for our temptations because He is a good God?

• I think he has a twofold purpose in mind:

- (1) So that we understand who is truly responsible for temptations.
- Have you noticed

 in this chapter
 that James

 has not mentioned the Devil?
 - You can't say
 "The Devil made me do it."
 - So who is the only one left?

- (2) So that we
 do not doubt

 the goodness of God
 during our temptations
- Adam tried blaming God:

 "The woman whom
 you gave to be with me,
 she gave me fruit of the tree,
 and I ate" (v. 12).
 - "The woman said,
 "The serpent deceived me, and I ate." (v. 13).
- Since the beginning of humanity <u>mankind has not taken</u> <u>responsibility for sin.</u>

• <u>1 Corinthians 10:13</u> No temptation has taken you but such as is common to man, but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted above what you are able but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that you may be able to bear it.

- So what is it that causes our temptations?
- Why are we always slipping up on the same old sins?
 - James answers:

"Each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire" (James 1:14).

- Trials and temptations are permitted to strengthen us.
- Make us stronger for God's service.
 - Compulsory service would be worthless.
 - So God demands
 voluntary service
 - Herein lies conflict, and the

secret of God's ways.

Isaiah 55:9 For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts.

- The source of our temptation is our own desire.
 - <u>Desire</u> is problem.
 - The problem lies within us.
 - Desire
 is not wrong.
 - What is wrong is how it is fulfilled.

- "Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness" is a well-known phrase from the United States <u>Declaration of Independence.</u>
 - All desire the "Pursuit of Happiness"
 - "Pursuit" is the **KEY** word.
 - But there are laws <u>that limit that</u> "<u>desire</u>".
 - One might decide to <u>rob a bank.</u>
 - Or murder an enemy.
 - And so forth.

 Notice James says that "each person is tempted," meaning that everyone faces temptations. (James 1:14)

 If you didn't, there would be no need for this passage of Scripture.

- James uses a
 <u>fishing metaphor</u>
 to describe what happens
 in temptation.
- Notice the language: "each person is tempted when he is **lured and enticed** by his own desire." (James 1:14)

- If we did not have the
 desires and weaknesses,
 then Satan would have nothing
 with which to tempt us.
 - Satan puts the bait

 on the hook

 and drops the line in the water.
 - The temptation comes from within us because we want the bait.

- A fish will have no interest if I put a brussel sprout on the hook and drop it in the water.
- Temptation only becomes effective if we desire it.
 - We all have desires
 that Satan is using
 to try to pull us
 away from God.

- God is not tempting us.
 - We have a desire that we want fulfilled.
 - But we must find godly ways
 to meet these desires
 - And not Satan's ways.

- Desire is the problem.
 - The Greek word for "*lured*".
- Literally meaning to be "dragged away."
 - The Greek word for "enticed"
 means to
 "set a trap."

- In Matthew 4
 we find Jesus
 alone in the wilderness.
- It is often when we are alone that temptation is the greatest.
 - No one sees us.
 - No one knows our secret.
 - So how did Jesus
 handle His temptation?

- **Matthew 4:1.**
- "by the Spirit,"
 cannot mean
 "by Jesus' own spirit"
 - 1 Peter 2:22 "Who did no sin."
 - 1 John 3:5 "in Him is no sin"

- "by the Spirit,"
 cannot mean
 "by Jesus' own spirit"
 - But must mean by the Holy Spirit (Matthew 3:16)

Showing us that
 it was God's will
 for Jesus
 to face temptation.

Hebrews 5:8 Although he was a son, he learned obedience through the things he suffered. 5:9 And by being perfected in this way, he became the source of eternal salvation to all who obey him,

- This passive verb
 in no way expresses
 a reluctance
 on the part of Jesus
 to meet the tempter.
- It intends to bring out the very opposite:
- The willingness of Jesus to do the divine will.
- Hebrews 10:9 "I come to do thy will, O God."

- Here we have the Battle of the ages.
 - Two Spirits:
 - God's Spirit
 and
 the devil.
- The human nature of Jesus,
 - <u>Vs.</u>
 - The Tempter of all humanity.

- And how did Jesus handle this test?
 - Jesus met every assault with a word of Scripture: "it is written".
 - And once written,
 stands forever.
 - Jesus smites the devil with "the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God," (Ephesians 6:17).

- And why did Jesus need to under go this trial or temptation?
 - The word used is a Greek word meaning "to test".
- No one ever faced greater test than Jesus.

Hebrews 4:15 For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin.

 How else would Jesus be our example.

- Every temptation that the Devil threw at Jesus failed.
 - It was His trust in the word of God that enabled him to defeat the evil one.
- By doing it in this way he enables all true believers to follow his example.

- We must not think
 that in one temptation

 Jesus conquered the tempter for ever.
 - Remember Peter:
 "Get behind me Satan."
 (Matthew 16:23).
- Jesus said to his disciples:
 You are they that have continued with me in my temptations;
 (Luke 22:28 ASV)

Temptation

is not meant to make us sin;

- But enable us to conquer sin.
- It is not meant to make us bad,
 - But to make us good.
 - It is not meant to weaken us,
 - But to make us stronger.

"Most people want to be delivered from temptation but would like it to keep in touch"

(Reader's Digest [8/86], p. 35).

• 1 Corinthians 10:12 (NET) So let the one who thinks he is standing be careful that he does not fall.

- In closing let us notice the contrast.
 - V. 12 "Crown of Life"
 - V. 15 "Death"
 - The two paths may seem like just a
 fork in the road.
 - But the destination is far different.

 For years, workers and visitors flocked to the sight of silvery dust flakes that floated to the floor in a mill where Joe Gutierrez worked.

Joe said,
 "the snow danced in August."


- It was beautiful and enchanting,

 as harmless as

 - Likewise,
 Sin
 is enchanting
 but deadly.
