

## Thus saith the Lord...

•James 3:1 My brethren, be not many teachers, knowing that we shall receive the greater condemnation.

In the first century
as the Church began to grow
there were many dangers.

• For one,
the Jewish Rabb
moved from
Judaism to Christianity.

 And this presented an ever present danger.

- For the Rabbi was treated in a way that was liable to ruin the character of any man.
- •His very name means, "My great one."

## • Everywhere he went he was treated with the utmost respect.

- It was actually held that
   a man's duty to his Rabbi
   exceeded his duty to his parents.
  - Because his parents only brought him into the life of this world
  - But his teacher brought him into the life of the world to come.

- It was desperately easy
  for a Rabbi to become
  the kind of person
  whom Jesus depicted:
  - A spiritual tyrant.
    - A lover of the <u>highest place</u>
       at any function,
  - A person who gloried in the respect
     showed to him in public (Matthew 23:4-7).

- Every teacher
   runs the risk
   of becoming
   that type of person
   Jesus described.
- No profession is more liable to beget spiritual and intellectual pride.
  - Than that of the preacher.

In the world a man/woman must start at the bottom and work their way up.

• For the preacher

he starts at the top

and in some cases sadly

works himself

to the bottom.

- There are two dangers which every teacher must avoid.
  - •# 1 He must not teach his own opinions or distort the truth.
- # 2 He must take every care not to contradict his teaching by his life.

- It is James' warning that the teacher
   is under great condemnation, if he fails in it.
  - The people to whom
     James was writing
     coveted the prestige
     of the teacher.
- James demanded that the teacher should never forget <u>his responsibility.</u>

## • James 3:2 For in many things we offend all. If any man offend not in word, the same is a mature man, and able also to bridle the whole body.

- No form of personal communication is more readily accessible and faster than speech.
- By <u>writing</u> we can convey our thoughts at a rate of <u>30 words</u> per minute.
  - **Typing**: About **50 words** per minute.
    - Text up to 60 words per minute.
    - But <u>speaking</u> can easily achieve <u>150 words</u> per minute!

- Both men and women speak an average of 16,000 words a day.
  - The claim that
     women speak
     twice as much as men
     is an urban legend.
    - Sorry, Guys!!

James sets down
 two ideas

which were woven into Jewish thought and literature.

• # 1 Sin is so often

not deliberate

but the result of

a slip up

when we are off our guard.

• This universality of sin runs all through the Bible.

# • Romans 3:10 There is none righteous, no, not one:

•Romans 3:23
For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;

- "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us" (1John 1:8).
  - •"There is not a righteous man on earth who does good and never sins,".
    (Ecclesiastes 7:20).

- # 2 There is no room for pride in human life,
- For there is not a man upon this earth who has not some blot of which to be ashamed.

- Even the pagan writers have the same conviction of sin.
  - "It is the nature of man to sin both in private and in public life," said Thucydides (3: 45).
    - "We all sin,"
      said Seneca,
      "some more grievously,
      some more lightly"
      (On Clemency 1: 6).

### • James 3:3

Behold, we put bits in the horses' mouths, that they may obey us; and we turn about their whole body.

• 3:4 Behold also the ships, which though they be so great, and are driven of fierce winds, yet are they turned about with a very small helm,...

- James is not saying that silence is better than speech.
  - He is pleading for the control of the tongue.

- Speech is a wonderful gift from God.
- When used properly, it can do marvelous things.
- Words that are carefully chosen have rallied the people together, built nations, and brought peace and prosperity.

- Some of history's
   greatest speeches
   have been recorded for posterity:
- Lincoln's Gettysberg address in 1863
  - Churchill's orations
     that rallied
     battle-weary England
     against German invasion.

- But speech is a sword that cuts both ways.
- It has destroyed <u>marriages</u> and <u>families</u>.
  - It has misled and deceived millions of people.
    - It has incited
       war and rebellion.
- And it has caused untold misery, death and destruction.

- There are a variety of ways to commit sin by what we say:
  - Telling <u>lies.</u>
  - False accusations,
    - Boasting,
    - Vulgar speech,
      - Cursing,
    - Backbiting, etc
  - Just to name a few.

- Just think of those moments when you have lashed out at someone in anger,
- Or deliberately slanted the truth in your own favor,
  - And then you will realize how difficult it is to bridle your tongue.

- So James says that it is
   <u>a great accomplishment</u>
   to bridle or control the tongue...
- Such a person is considered to be <u>a perfect man.</u>
  - A believer who has <u>developed spiritual maturity.</u>
  - This is how you can tell if you have grown spiritually
    - How well you control your unruly tongue.

- James 3:5
  Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasts great things.
- Behold, how great a matter a little <u>fire</u> kindles!
- 3:6 And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity:
  - it <u>defiles</u> the whole body,
- and sets on fire the course of nature;
  - and it is set on fire of hell.

- And sets on fire the course of nature...

  (James 3:6 KJV)
- James 3:6 (NET)
   "and sets fire to the
   course of human existence..."
  - •That it is a life long battle.

We always tell kids,
 "Don't play with matches,
 or else you might
 burn the whole house down
 and hurt many people."

 Let it be know that our tongue is able to do
 far worse than that!

## • James 3:7

For every kind of beasts, and of birds, and of serpents, and of things in the sea, is tamed, and has been tamed of mankind:

 James now compares the tongue to a wild animal that no man can ever tame.

- Notice that it says that no man can tame the tongue.
- But what is impossible with man is entirely possible with God. (Luke 18:27)
  - And we need
     God's help
     to tame it
     and
     bring it under control.

- There can be no change in our speech until our heart is regenerated.
  - Notice verse 12:
- "Can the fig tree, my brethren, bear olive berries? either a vine, figs?"
  - The answer is of course, No.
    - The only way

      to change
      the fruit of a tree
      is to change the nature of
      the tree itself.

- The only way to change our speech is to change our sinful heart.
  - And that is something only God can do.
  - After the heart

    is regenerated

    or

    renewed

    it will gradually give rise to a changed life.

- How is one regenerated?
  - It is <u>not</u> some miraculous operation of the Holy Spirit.
  - However, the Spirit does play a part.
  - •How might that be?

#### • Colossians 3:5 (NET)

So put to death whatever in your nature belongs to the earth: sexual immorality, impurity, shameful passion, evil desire, and greed which is idolatry.

- 3:6 Because of these things the wrath of God is coming on the sons of disobedience.
  - 3:7 You also lived your lives in this way at one time, when you used to live among them.
    - 3:8 But now, put off all such things as anger, rage, malice, slander, abusive language from your mouth.
- 3:9 Do not lie to one another since you have put off the old man with its practices
  - 3:10 and have been clothed with the new man that is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of the one who created it.

- Philippians 4:8
  Finally, brethren,
  whatsoever things are:
  - True,
  - Honest,
    - Just,
    - Pure,
  - lovely,
  - of good report;
- think on these things.
- •What are you thinking?

- What did Jesus say?
- "A good man out of the good treasure of his heart brings forth that which is good;

 and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart brings forth that which is evil: for of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks." (Luke 6:45)

#### **•James 3:5**

- "...the tongue is a little member, and boas great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindles!
- •3:6 And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defiles the whole body, and sets on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell.

- One of the largest forest fires of all time is the Great Fire of 1910.
  - Called: "Big Burn", and the
     "Devil's Broom"
  - This fire burned over <u>3,000,000 acres</u> in three different states.
    - It affected ten national forests.
      - It killed 87 people.
    - Cause: sparks that flew off of a train.
      - Just small embers.
      - What harm could they do?

## • James 3:14 "lie not against the truth."

- Truthfulness is essential in courts of law.
- A court of law can mete out justice only as far as the witnesses are truthful.
  - There can be <a href="mailto:no-justice">no justice</a>
    if no one is truthful.

- Ascertaining the truth is so crucial to the process of justice, that perjury or lying to the court is punished severely.
- But the most
   severe punishment
   for lying comes from God,
   the Highest Judge of all.

• Revelation 21:8 (NET)
But as for the cowards, unbelievers, detestable persons, murderers, the sexually immoral, and those who practice magic spells, idol worshipers,

- and all those who lie,
- their place will be in the lake that burns with fire and sulfur.
  - That is the second death."

- Why does God hate lying and liars?
  - Because He is the God of truth.
- That is what He calls Himself four times in Scripture:
- The God of truth!
   (Deuteronomy 32:3; Psalm 31:5; Isaiah 65:16)
  - As God's children we are to reflect

this same characteristic in our life. 44

- Truthfulness may not matter very much to a world that thrives on <u>deceit</u> and <u>falsehood</u>,
  - And where the truth is often hidden
     for the
     most selfish reasons.

- David asks a probing question.
  - LORD, who shall abide in your tabernacle?...
- He that walks uprightly, and works righteousness, and speaks the truth...
- He that backbites not with his tongue, nor does evil to his neighbor....
  - He that swears
     to his own hurt,
     and changes not.
     (Psalm 15:1-5)

- Whatever we say must be said in love and not in malice.
   (Ephesians 4:15)
- Speaking the truth in love will edify and encourage others.
  - Truth without love is <u>cold</u> and <u>hard</u>.
  - Speaking truth without love <u>hurts</u> rather than <u>helps</u>.

- 1 Corinthians 13:1
   Speaking without love is like
   'sounding brass
   or a
   tinkling cymbal'.
- It makes one nothing but an irritating noise-maker.
- That is why we must examine our hearts before correcting a friend or brother who has sinned.

 According to Philippians 1:10, one of the things that Paul desired to see in the lives of the Philippian believers was sincerity.

• He prayed, "...that they may be sincere and without offense till the day of Christ."

- According to James 3:9 one of the proper uses of the tongue is to bless God.
  - "Therewith bless we God, even the Father..."
    - It is inconsistent
       <u>to curse men</u>
       with the same tongue
       that blesses God,
    - The reason:
      Since all are made
      in the image of God...

- There is nothing bad about having a sense of humor.
- Humor itself is good.
  - •Our Lord Himself used some humor at times.

- Psalm 59:8
- But You, O Lord, laugh at them;
  - You scoff at all the nations.

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- Psalm 2:4
- He who sits in the heavens laughs,
  - The Lord scoffs at them.

- Psalm 37:13
- The Lord laughs at him,
- For He sees his day is coming.

Wisdom from Above

James 3:13-14 (NET)
Who is wise and understanding

Who is wise and understanding among you?

By his good conduct he should show his works done in the gentleness that wisdom brings.

• 3:14 But if you have bitter jealousy and selfishness in your hearts, do not boast and tell lies against the truth.

### Wisdom from Above

- <u>James 3:15-16</u> (NET)
- 3:15 Such wisdom does not come from above but is earthly, natural, demonic.
  - 3:16 For where there is jealousy and selfishness, there is disorder and every evil practice.

#### Wisdom from Above

- James 3:17-18 (NET)
- 3:17 But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, accommodating, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial, and not hypocritical.
  - 3:18 And the fruit that consists of righteousness is planted in peace among those who make peace.
