
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Thus saith the Lord...

The prophet Haggai recorded
 <u>four messages</u>
 to the Jewish people of Jerusalem in
 <u>520 BC</u>,

• Eighteen years
after their return from
exile in Babylon
(538 BC).

Haggai 2:3 indicate that the prophet had seen Jerusalem before the destruction of the temple in 586 BC,

 Meaning he was more than seventy years old by the time he delivered his prophecies.

- He was a prophet with a passionate desire
 to see his people
 rise up from the
 ashes of exile
 - And reclaim their rightful place as God's light to the nations.
 (Isaiah 49:6)

- Haggai's prophecy came at a time when the people of Judah were extremely vulnerable.
 - They had been humbled
 by their exile to Babylon,
 - But hopeful
 as they returned
 to their Promised Land.

- But then discouraged
 by opposition
 in their rebuilding
 of the temple
 that they had quit
 (Ezra 4:24).
- Now, sixteen years later,
 with Haggai blaming their
 lack of food, clothing, etc.
 on their failure to rebuild the temple,
 - The Jews were
 <u>receptive to his message</u>
 of rebuilding the Lord's house.

- Unlike most of the other prophets,
 Haggai explicitly dated his prophecies,
 down to the day.
 - He gave
 four separate messages:
 - The first -- August 29, 520 BC (Haggai 1:1);
 - The second on <u>October 17, 520 BC</u> (Haggai 2:1);
- And the final two on <u>December 18, 520 BC</u> (Haggai 2:10, 20).

- After thousands of years, the book of Haggai remains unique for one key reason:
 - The people of Judah listened!

- Through the physical act of rebuilding the temple, the people began to indicate a shift in their spiritual lives:
 - From devotion to self
 - Toward devotion
 to God.

- Haggai had an important reminder for the Jews who had recently returned from exile.
- They put God on the back burner.
 - Choosing to focus
 on their own interests.
 - So it was time for them to "consider their ways" (Haggai 1:5, 7).
 - So Haggai directed them to finish rebuilding God's temple.

 Haggai continued to encourage them with the hope of future glory in the temple (Haggai 2:7-9, 21-22).

- After returning from Babylon they faced intense <u>opposition</u>.
 - External and Internal.

• Ezra 4:15 records the external resistance.

- The enemies of Judah first attempted to <u>infiltrate</u> the ranks of the builders,
- And when that didn't work, they resorted to scare tactics.

- Haggai focused on the internal opposition: Their own sin.
- The Jews had placed their own interests before the Lord's interests.
- Looking after their own

 safety and security
 without giving consideration
 to the status of the Lord's house.

- <u>Decision-making</u> is a fundamental part of daily life.
- The process of decision making involves choosing one option over another.
 - Most often we choose the option that is most advantageous to us.
 - Revealing what is important to us.

• As Christians. our daily decisions often reveal that our real priorities are very different than our claimed priorities.

- We may claim that the Lord and His work <u>is first in our lives,</u>
- But the real test comes in what our decisions reveal to be the real priorities of our lives.

- A priority
 has been defined as

 a necessity that
 can't be ignored.
- It may bring difficulty or <u>hardship</u>,
- But it functions as
 <u>a driving force</u>
 that controls our
 <u>thinking</u>, <u>acting</u>, <u>choosing</u>.

- Any successful endeavor involves setting goals
 - And then determining what steps must be taken and what choices must be made in order to accomplish that mission.
 - Those choices become priorities.

- For the Christian,
 God has set an agenda.
- He has established
 His work as our mission.
- This is <u>not</u> a new problem.
- God's people in every age have always struggled with the issue of making God's work and God's agenda their priority.

- Such was the case with the Jews who had recently returned to Jerusalem for the purpose of rebuilding their temple.
 - Somewhere along the way, they got distracted
 and
 lost sight of the goal.
 - And you might be asking:
 So why is the building of the temple
 such a Big Deal?

- Other things became more important and soon the work had ceased all together.
- God sent a prophet named
 <u>Haggai</u>

 to challenge the people.
- He had one simple question:
 "Consider your ways."
- Where are your priorities?

Haggai can be best divided into four main messages: A call to:

- Renew the Work of God (1:1-15)
- Reject a Negative Spirit (2:1-9)
- A Call To Personal Holiness (2:10-19)
- A Call to Participate in God's Victory (2:20-23)

- Haggai 1:1-15
 The message is
 about the temple
 - but it isn't!
- The rebuilding of the temple

 was just a metaphor

 for the larger issue at hand:

 the work of God itself!

Any work of God to which He calls His people must become a priority.

- Sadly, often we become ensnared by the <u>cares</u> and "<u>stuff</u>" of life,
 - And the work of God eventually is set aside in the busyness of life!

Haggai presented
 ways
 by which the

by which the
Jews of his day
could renew
the work of God

They are just as valid for our day.

Renew God's Work by Refusing to Offer Excuses (Habakki 1:1-2)

- God's displeasure with His people is evidenced by the terms He uses to address them.
 - Instead of addressing them as "My people"
 - He calls them
 "this people"
 (Habakki 1:2).

- He is angry with Judah
 because they have not done
 what He desired
 them to do.
- They had abandoned the work of rebuilding His temple.
 - It had been 15 years
 since the last work had been done
 on the foundation
- And not one brick had been laid for the temple.
 - The people excused their inactivity by observing that "the time had not come" for the building of the temple. (Haggai 1:2)

- There was too much rubble;
- The project was too immense;
 - Too much opposition.
- The time was
 never right for the people
 to dedicate themselves
 to God's work.
- There is no better time to obey God than:
 - Right Now!

- There was plenty of time and opportunity to accomplish their own work!
 - While there was no convenient time to build God's house
 - God challenges them to "Consider their Ways" (Haggai 1:5)
 - In other words, "Adjust your priorities!" (Habakki 1:3-6)

- Our priorities need adjusting when our work is more important to us than God's work!
 - God's people had
 <u>no time for the temple</u>
 but they had time and
 energy for their own burdens.
- God sent a strong message to those who put their work ahead of God's work.
 - Consider your ways!
 (Haggai 1:5 & 7)

- They planted more and harvested less.
 - They worked more and earned less.
- This was <u>not</u> just misfortune of circumstance.
- God was divinely frustrating all their efforts (Haggai 1:9).
- Again God instructs His people to:
 Consider their ways
 (Haggai 1:5 & 7)

- Haggai preached to the people

 and announced that
 God wanted them to respond
 to His instruction
 to consider their ways.
 - He wanted them to <u>renew His work</u>
 by adjusting their priorities.
 - And completing the task at hand.

- God instructs the people to drop what they are doing and head to the mountains to get wood for the temple.
 - Perhaps all the materials had been <u>used</u>
 or <u>ruined</u> during the
 <u>15 years of inactivity.</u>
 (Haggai 1:8).

- God 's temple will have an ultimate goal.
 - The ultimate goal is to glorify God!
 - We do not obey because God needs a temple.
 - We obey because it glorifies Him!
 - **How?**

- Putting God's work ahead of ours is costly.
- God reminds this nation that the cost of disobedience is even greater than the inconvenience of putting His work ahead of their work!
 - In short, there is a high cost to
 Iow living. (Haggai 1:9-11)

- Disobedience is never a short cut to success and prosperity spiritually or otherwise.
- As it never leads you to your desired destination.
- God reveals that when His people live disobediently, He sets Himself against them!
- Since they had abandoned His work, He would abandon theirs.
 (Haggai 1:9-11)

- Since His house lay in ruins.
 He would see that their land and their efforts would come to ruin.
- Their lands, crops, and endeavors would be as untouched by His blessing as His temple had been by their hands.
 - God has a very powerful way of <u>getting the attention</u>
 of a disobedient people.

- Haggai records

 a wonderful response
 to his preaching.
 (Haggai 1:12)
- Zerubbabel and the people repented and put their hand to the work and obeyed the voice of the Lord!
 - Haggai goes on to reveal that this obedience caused Zerubbabel and the people to fear the presence of the Lord.

- Far from being a negative coerced fear,
 - This was a fear of reverence for God.
- The people began to grow in their love for God's presence!
- A second blessing that resulted from obedience is wisdom.

- When we have a
 proper reverence for God
 the scripture teaches this

 is the beginning of wisdom.
- The fear of the Lord leads us to the wisdom of the Lord.

 (Proverbs 1:1-5)
 - When we fear God, <u>we will heed</u>
 and
 obey His words.
 - His Word will be the way of wisdom for us!

- When God saw the obedient response of His people.
- He instructed them to be strong as He had done with Joshua and Moses before him. (Haggai 2:4)

- Stirred by the message from God preached by Haggai.
 - Zerubbabel;
- Joshua the high priest;
 - And the people.
 - Began to renew
 the work on
 the temple.
 (Haggai 1:14).

 God's people in Haggai's day were no different than His people today.

Like us,
 they were susceptible
 <u>to discouragement</u>
 and
 <u>disillusionment</u>
 in the midst of obeying God's work.

- As the work began to proceed on the temple,
 it soon became clear
 that this temple
 would not even come close
 to the beauty of the former temple.
 - How often we grow discouraged when we reflect on God's glorious work in the past and compare our present meager efforts for Him.
 - Soon the work of God is in real danger.

- This temple might seem small and insignificant in their eyes.
- But God had
 <u>bigger plans</u>
 for this little temple
 than He ever had for the former one!
 - In this temple,
 He would make peace for all the world!
- This little temple would actually receive
 His promised Messiah one day!
 (Haggai 2:1-3)

- As the work dragged on, the workers grew tired and discouraged;
 - But God had

 a message

 for His people.
 - What was that message?

In Zechariah 4:6
 we have a message from God to Zechariah
 (a contemporary of Haggai)
 {Ezra 5:1;6:14}

- And that message is:
- This is the word of the LORD unto Zerubbabel, saying,
 - Not by might,
 - nor by power,
 - but by my spirit,
 - saith the LORD of hosts.

- Zechariah 4:6
- Needing special encouragement the angel of the Lord delivered a special message:
 - Not by might,
 (of thy own),
 - Or by power,
 (authority from others),
 - But by my Spirit
 (the power of the Most High.

Then God had another message.

• Haggai 2:6-7 For thus saith the LORD of hosts; ... it is a little while,

- and I will shake the heavens, and the earth, and the sea, and the dry land;
 - 2:7 And I will shake all nations,
 - and the desire of all nations shall come:
- and I will fill this house with glory, saith the LORD of hosts.

- Haggai foretells that the glory of the second temple.
- Will be much greater than that which Solomon had built.
 - And had been burnt by
 the Chaldeans.

- The temple of Solomon
 was much richer,
 and more magnificent
 than that built in
 the time of Haggai;
 - But never the less
 the glory of the second
 would be much greater
 than the first.

- Because

 the Messiah

 was to enter into it.
- This prophecy plainly foretells that the Messiah should come while the second temple was standing.

- And as that temple

 no longer exist,
 we must confess

 that the Messiah has come,
 - And that this Messiah is <u>Jesus Christ our Lord.</u>
 - This is one of the clearest prophecies in all the old testament.

 Jehovah shall come to this temple,

• Filling it with
the glory of
the only-begotten
of the Father
full of grace and truth.
(John 1:14)

There He shall build the living temple;
(1 Peter 2:5)

 Adorn his saints with <u>gifts</u> and <u>grace</u>; (Ephesians 4:8) There He will give a new law out of Zion, (John 13:34)

• There the

<u>Word of the Lord</u>

shall go from Jerusalem

<u>into all the world.</u>


(Luke 24:47)
